Vice President Alleene Smith introduced our speaker, Tom Wise of John's Island Orchids.

Tom's topic was "A Bakers' Dozen— Thirteen Orchids for Southern Growers".

First on his list was **Cattleya aclandiae and hybrids**. These Brazilian bifoliates have received hundreds of awards and do very well mounted on a stick or the side of a pot.

Second is **Bc. Maikai**, a primary hybrid of B. nodosa x C. bowringiana. This plant grows like a weed. Two popular cultivars are 'Mayumi' and 'Louise'. Bc. Maikai is one of the "every orchid grower should have at least one" plants.

Third is **Cattleya intermedia**, a Brazilian coastal species whose range extends from Rio de Janeiro south to Brazil's border into Uruguay . One particularly nice plant is Cattleya intermedia var. coerulea 'Celeste' HCC/AOS. The aquinii form has splash petals and is widely used in breeding.

Number 4 is **Cattleya Beaufort** and hybrids. Beaufort is a cross between Cattleya coccinea and Cattleya luteola. This cross makes smaller, heat tolerant Cats. Any cultivars with the name 'Elmwood' are particularly nice.

Fifth is hybrid **Coelogyne Unchained Melody** —often misidentified as mossiae (a species); it is a primary hybrid of Coel. cristata and Coel. flaccida.

Sixth is easy to grow **Dendrochilum species** like filiforme, glumaceum, latifolium, and others. He remembered a very large wenzelii at the 2015 SCOS Riverbanks show.

Number 7 is **Paphiopedilum subgenus Parvisepalum**. Sometimes known as "Toilet Bowl" orchids because of the wide lip pouch. Tom grows these in Lava Rock. He is fond of armeniacum and delenatii. Tom Nasser had two delenatii on the show table.

Number 8 is the Southeast Asian **Paphiopedilum sub-genus Sigmatopetalum cultivars**. These

plants are very good for heat and humidity. Paph. Macabre (Paph. sukhakulii x Paph Voodoo Magic) has 196 awards.

Number 9 is the **Dendrobium Nobile Hybrids**. Normally Carter and Holmes has many of these. Notable are Stardust (Den. unicum x Den. Ukon) and Super Ise (Den. Super Star x Den. Ise). He said if you only have one Nobile type Dendrobium in your collection, it should be Den. Dream 'Ace'. This plant grows like a weed, blooms several times a year and he did have one for sale

Number 10 is **Neofinetia falcata** and hybrids. These are ideal for people who want vandaceous plants that can be grown on a small scale in a home. Neostylis Lou Sneary 'Bluebird' is a really good growing plant. Ascofinetia Cherry Blossom (Neofinetia falcata x Ascocentrum ampullaceum) is also a good choice.

Number 11 is smaller **Angraecums**: compactum and leonis. These compact plants and flowers can take heat and high humidity.

Number 12 is **Bulbophyllums**. These warm growers comprise the largest genus in the Orchid Kingdom—but be careful which plant you choose because some have very strong and disagreeable scents. He recommends Bulbophyllum lobbii `Kathy's Gold'.

And, number 13 is "What ever works best for you". He says don't waste time and money on plants that don't work for you. When possible choose primary hybrids to work with. He finished up with a few culture tips:

----Potting media. If what you have works, don't change it. He uses primarily Lava Rock but it needs to be well drained and it can hold a deceptively large amount of water so take care not to over water. He has not had good luck with cypress mulch mix.

----Clay pots are not all the same. Be careful of ones that are not 100% terracotta. Those don't wick as well as the older type..

----Use quality sphagnum, he likes the products from New Zealand.

----Use a fertilizer with a low middle number (phosphorus).

----Orchids have a front and back: make sure the front is facing the sun.

<u>Carolina Orchids from Columbia, SC:</u> North on I-77 to exit 88. Turn left on Gold Hill Rd. Go 0.3 miles to 2nd stoplight; turn right on Pleasant Rd. Go 1.4 miles to our driveway on left (after Beacon Knoll subdivision on right.)

Carolina Orchids from Greenville, SC: North on I-85 toward Charlotte. Exit 30 on I-485 (toward Columbia) then I-77S. At I-77 Exit 90, turn right on Carowinds Blvd. Go 0.7 miles to stoplight in front of Carowinds rollercoasters. Turn left on Pleasant Road. Go 1.4 miles to Carolina Orchids on right (just past entrance to Catawba Village townhouses). If you reach Beacon Knoll subdivision on your left, you went 200 feet too far. Carolina Orchids from Charlotte, NC: South on I-77 to exit 90. R on Carowinds Blvd. Go 0.7 miles to stoplight in front of Carowinds rollercoasters. Turn left on Pleasant Road. Go 1.4 miles to Carolina Orchids on right (just past entrance to Catawba Village townhouses). If get to Beacon Knoll subdivision on your left, you went 200 feet too far.
